



#### Rich Family Endowment for Student-led and Community-based Projects Fall 2021 Application

The Rich Family Endowment is an Act Level program in the Center for Civic Leadership that provides Houston community contacts and priorities, curriculum on civic professionalism and ethical engagement, alumni mentorship, and funding to student leaders for civically engaged projects. Community partners put forward issue focus areas for which they are seeking student-led project proposals that will involve mobilizing fellow students to build the capacity of the organization. Applicants (in partnerships or small groups) will select a community partner and identified need area from the application form (or identify a partner and opportunity on their own) and propose a correlating project idea they would like to work on throughout the fall semester in preparation for spring 2022 implementation.

#### Mission

The purpose of the Hilda and Hershe Rich Family Endowment is to support student leadership development with a positive societal impact, through critical service, advocacy, civic research projects, and/or other relevant activities. Successful applicants will engage the Houston community, the Rice University campus community, and foster leadership and creativity among Rice students.


In addition to the Rich Family Endowment (RFE) goals, applications should align with the mission of the Center for Civic Leadership, which is "to foster community-university collaborations that analyze the complexity of social issues and take actions to promote equitable and inclusive communities." Applicants should demonstrate that they are approaching their project from an informed and ethically sound position in order to align with RFE.

#### Overview

The selected cohort of student leaders will be supported throughout the development of their project with biweekly workshops, alumni mentorship, and collaboration with their community partner. Workshops will be focused on critical philanthropy from the benefactors' and participants' perspective of the process, effective strategies for mobilization and leadership of peers, and ensuring ethical and effective project development. The cohort will engage in critical reflection together and individually throughout this process and will ultimately submit an end- of-grant report that will include a program description, financial information, project activities, results and impact, and potential next steps.

#### Overall:

- The purpose of the program is to support student led, community-based projects that seek to mobilize their peers in addressing critical social issues in the Houston community.
  - The projects should be representative of at least one of the civic practices: advocacy and activism, civic research, service, policy and governance, and/or philanthropy.
  - The program will be run entirely virtually; projects may be proposed as fully virtual or include some in-person aspects as is possible within Rice University and CDC Guidelines for fall 2021 and spring 2022
- Applicants can propose to work with listed partners above, or another Houston area community partner to codevelop the project.
- Successful applications will engage Rice students and/or local high school or college students to participate in the implementation of the project (need not be already recruited for application purposes).
- Applications should align with the mission of the Center for Civic Leadership: fosters community-university collaborations that analyze the complexity of social issues and take actions to promote equitable and inclusive communities.
- Applicants should demonstrate that their project is from an informed and ethically sound position.
- Program participants will receive support and mentorship from the various stakeholders and partnerships through one-on-one meetings and cohort meetings.
- Program participants will submit an end-of-grant report as well as participate in a showcase of the collective projects.

#### **Qualifications**

- Undergraduate and Graduate Rice students
- We encourage students to apply in pairs or teams given the collaborative nature of community work and the goal of mobilizing other students during the implementation stage.

#### **Funding & Expenses**

- Student leaders will receive an \$900 stipend for their work on this project. We anticipate students committing an average of 10 hours a week for the project.
- Within the application, students will describe potential expenses for their project (note: stipends have already been allocated and should not be included in the proposed budget)

#### Timeline

- Application released: week of August 23rd
- Info session, partner meetings, and advising sessions: weeks of August 23rd and 30th
- Application drop in session: Thursday, September 9th from 9-12am
- Applications due: Sunday, September 12th at 11:59pm Central Time
- Selection Committee meeting and announcements: week of September 27th
- Cohort and alumni mentor meetings begin: week of October 4th
- Project implementation begins: December or January depending on individual project timelines
- Projects completed: by end of May 2022
- Showcase of RFE projects: TBD (late August, early September)
